

RED BREED GENETICS - 2024 REPORT

Logan Kelly - RBG Convenor

We have on offer two bulls again this season. The first is Burness Vimo Pace, this bull is a rising two-year-old because last year we decided he wasn't old enough to produce semen. His dam is Burness F Pace by VR Fonseca one of the better bulls in my opinion to come into New Zealand, so there is a good blend of Viking genetics in this bull.

The other bull is Brecon Baltimore P. He is out of a Durango dam, they looked like one of the best type cows in the Brecon herd during the conference visit.

We have tried to put processes in place to streamline the selection policy, we were having issues with the 3GPs all being ordered at different times and with the new animal evaluation runs they were out of date. So from now on, we are ordering all the 3GPs on the same day so it's a fair comparison. The team will have a few days for their opinions and then the three bulls will be sent to Semex.

The two bulls receiving new proofs this season are both dead so when the semen is gone that will be it. We tried to negotiate with Semex to collect more semen when the bulls are first collected but it didn't happen.

I'd like to thank Semex for the six bull spread in the 2024 catalogue and to the people who put the effort in to supply quality photos, it does make a difference.

I would also like to thank my RBG team and Semex.

HOW ARE THE PRODUCTION STATISTICS CALCULATED?

Production information is now sourced via BreedIT, the Breed Society platform. BreedIT is sourcing all data for this reporting from DIGAD (Dairy Industry Good Animal Database). While DairyNZ sources all raw data from the herd testing companies, they then apply the ICAR Cattle Milk Recording guidelines https://www.icar.org/index.php/icar-recording-guidelines/. This means that the calculated lactation records including DIM (and therefore herd averages and indexes) will look different to what members are seeing on their MINDA records. While the reported data does not match members MINDA records, as the data is calculated in a consistent manner rankings of animals and herds are not affected. Mid-season cow sales may render herd numbers inaccurate in some cases.

Herd and animal data is calculated on animals that calved in 2023 (between 1 January and 31 December) with a minimum of 4 herd tests within 305 days after the start of the lactation.

As an internal control, NZ Milking Shorthorn individual animal data is also limited according to the NZ Milking Shorthorn Assn By-Laws as follows

- Pedigree and S1S animals are eligible for Production Awards
- All registered animals born prior to 2015 are eligible for Production Awards until the 2023/24 production season, after which the S1S & over rule will be applied. All animals born 2015 onwards are only eligible for Production Awards from S1S status and over.
 - o This applies to individual cow awards only, not herd awards.
 - o There will be no change to the production listings in the magazine, or Merit & Elite Merit awards

A herd must have a minimum of 10 registered Milking Shorthorns. Herd average data includes all registered Milking Shorthorns, regardless of registration status. Only data on registered animals is available, therefore herd awards are calculated on registered animals by breed.

An opportunity to fit in a visit to New Zealand came up after judging at two shows in Australia. The shows were three weeks apart so in the interim period Russell Tocker planned a busy itinerary for me over the available six days I had! This was an excellent opportunity to see the NZ cattle for myself having already been impressed by the NZ Dairy Shorthorn from reading online and in the journals.

STgenetics had also just started to market this year three of our own homebred sires. Cotonhall Rumble, Spartan and Solomon being selected to purchase from Shorthorn Sires UK.

After a delayed flight from Melbourne to Auckland I arrived late at night to the Kaihere herd of Ian Dibble where I stayed for the next two nights.



The first morning was an early start to view the Kaihere herd where I was able to see daughters of Kaihere Goldmine and K Rugby ET, these daughters being the most impressive along with a nice Treeton Scarlet Zumba milking heifer. In the youngstock, the Circle B Lucky Strike daughters stood out with a few Kaihere Protector's also featured.



We then moved on to the herd of Peter May. Northbrook Duncan and Brecon Durango had worked very well here in a herd of over 300 head milking. An all-round productive farm with milky cows, good facilities, and track infrastructure.

After lunch, we visited the Alexander Organics herd. Here it was great to see the longevity of the breed on this low-cost, low-input system, with cattle looking in great condition. A testament to the breed for sure and it was great chatting to Jesiah.

The last herd to see that day was the newly established herd of Vat Fullers of Noah Dibble with a couple of Glencliffe Jedi daughters looking good in the pasture having competed on the show circuit this last summer. Noah selected several cattle from Ian Dibble's Kaihere herd to help get established with the milking herd. Kaihere Perfume and Pleasant were two incredibly good individuals and look promising brood cows.



The next day was a morning visit to see the Kiteroa Ayrshire herd of Zane Kite. A herd with high type and longevity with enormous success using homebred sires.



Bekay Blitz Angelo and Glencliffe Jedi worked well in the milking herd along with Oliver Woods Carbo P that I saw several daughters of in herds I visited over the next few days.



A quick stop with Daniel Simons to see his herd with a Gorbo Jazzy that had a super udder being the pick. Daniel then took me up Mount Taranaki to see the amazing views.

Ross then drove me down to Palmerston North to meet up with Russell Tocker. After seeing some of his Tiakitahuna herd while in for afternoon milking we then toured the farm viewing the young stock that looked in very good condition.

A chance to then see the Northbrook cows of David Woods and family with daughters from Oceanbrae Foster and Bentley doing an excellent job displaying nice type but the favourites here were the recent bull mothers to Northbrook Delta and Chief. Both cows very impressive for their age and the type I like.



Late evening I stayed over with Alan and Sue Moore of Waiwera Shorthorns with a lovely view from their home.

The next morning included a chance to see the Belleview herd of Mike and Jason Treder that milk once a day with the EX scored Carbo P daughter along with Northbrook Plato heifers impressing here. After viewing the herd, we then went to the highest point of the farm and saw more fantastic views.



We went on to see the Waiwera herd after the morning feed on the feed pad with a mid morning milking in progress with a few farms now dropping to the 16 hour system of three milking in two days to gradually switch them off for next years calving season.

Here the Northbrook Duncan, Elmo and Arlo daughters shown in numbers along with a Treeton Pingerley senior cow showing very good type.

After a quick lunch at the local pub, I caught a flight down to Christchurch to meet with Margaret Bailey. Margaret took me to their Elmgrove stud where Margaret and her husband Chrisfarm.



After morning milking, the feed was put outside in the paddock for the milking herd so I could have a look at them. Here I saw great framed cows and great udder texture on many individuals. Glencliffe Jedi daughters were again very uniform. Westell Carbo Arlo daughters in first lactation looked great cow makers. Chris and Margaret then took me to the Smiths' family stud of Eyretonlea Milking Shorthorns.

At Eyretonlea, St Andrews Alliance daughters were very milky with tall dairy front ends. Brecon White Knight daughters were very balanced along with Eyretonlea Ted Shrek daughters that were making good mature cows.





Mark McDonald met us at Eyretonlea ahead of an hour drive to his home of the Brecon herd at Methven in Canterbury. Here I stayed for the next two nights.

It was a great sight to see the next morning with 500 milk cows outside in the pasture. A super uniformed herd with incredibly good udder attachments and udder texture, with excellent feet and legs.

Many very impressive individuals here but an absolute favourite was Brecon BNK Nova along with Brecon Taika Rachel. Nova, the dam of Novak at World Wide Sires was such a balanced cow with great dairy character, open ribbed with an impressive udder and super feet and legs. Over in the stock bull paddock Brecon Hurricane and Brecon Rua displayed good type. Hurricane calves from this last calving season were also impressive being long and dairy.



A short travel in the car to see The Rivers herd of Ruurd and Rachel Lieuwes. The Gorbo Jazzy and Brecon Dylan progeny looked in particularly good order and producing good yields.

After a whirlwind six days in New Zealand, Mark got me to Christchurch Airport ready for my flight to Sydney.

I would like to take this opportunity to say a huge thank you to everyone involved for making this short trip possible and for making it all work so well. I travelled hundreds of miles and everyone I met was a pleasure to spend time with and the great generosity and hospitality offered was immeasurable.

I would also like to thank Mark and Jenny for hosting me whilst already busy with their two-year-old grandson Fin. Fin was staying with them whilst eagerly awaiting the arrival of his new baby brother.

The New Zealand Milking Shorthorns offer very promising genetics to overseas breeders, I believe, especially after seeing a few Brecon Kaikoura milking in Australia. The NZ Shorthorns were compact dairy cattle with excellent feet and legs, longevity, high milk solids and fertility that suit the NZ farming systems.

Again, A big thank you for such a fantastic opportunity.

David Buick

Last year with the Central Districts 100th Year Anniversary approaching I did a little study up of historical herds near to me. Flicking through the breed century book, I came across the Cloverlea herd of David Buick. Further readings of his herd shows as follows:

Registration of 13 bulls and 30 females in Volume 1 of the Herd Book in 1915. Prominent bulls from the herd used in other herds were Cloverlea Digby, Cloverlea Earl and Cloverlea Red Indian. The Kaiwharehou Sale Catalogue 1950 describes Cloverlea as perhaps the leading stud in 1915, as well the herd was dispersed 1924. Cloverlea also bred the first New Zealand Royal Show Champion cow Studleigh Nancy Lee with production of 623 lb of fat at 8 years old.

An advertisement from a dispersal sale states that Pedigree Milking Shorthorn cattle from the famous herd of Mr David Buick, Kairanga, Palmerston North are to be sold by public auction on Thursday 19th June 1924 ... at the Cattle Pavilion on Showground.

A look into David Buick's background shows that he was born in Wellington in 1848. His father, William Buick, had come to Wellington in 1841 on the Arab from England. Buick Senior farmed in the Hutt Valley, with Buick Junior taking over the farm in 1867. On 5 June 1876, he married Mary Ann Buick (née Hill), daughter of I. M. Hill from Nelson.

In 1881, Buick Junior bought land in the Manawatu's Kairanga Block. Living at a time when many New Zealanders were immigrants, Buick was proud of his birth in the colony and referred to it on occasion.

Buick was a successful breeder of Romney Marsh sheep. Buick bred race horses and they won several high-profile races, which certainly helped his political career. He played a fundamental role in establishing the freezing works in Longburn. For some time, he was the president of the Manawatu Caledonian Society.

Mr David Buick, as a Member of Parliament, bio from the internet is as follows:

The new member for Palmerston was born at Karori, Wellington in 1848 and is the son of late Mr William Buick, who arrived in the colony, per ship Arab, in 1841. His parents re-moving to the Hutt in 1852, Mr Buick received his education there. He worked on his father's farm at the

Hutt till 1867, when he took possession, the place henceforth being known as "Greenvale Farm." Re-moving from the Hutt in 1885, Mr Buick came to Palmerston North and purchased some 550 acres of first-class grazing land on Rangitikei Line, where he established a famous stud of Romney Marsh sheep.

Later Mr Buick took up a farm in the Kairanga, near Palmerston. Mr Buick has been a prominent member of local bodies and has taken part in local government for many years. Whilst residing at the Hutt he was elected a member of the first Board there, and also held the position of Lieutenant in the Petone Navals during 1883 and 1884. He is chairman of the Manawatu Road Board and Drainage Board, which positions he ably filled for some time. Mr Buick has twice previously contested the Palmerston seat, in 1896 and in 1899. He is a typical farming member and his wide experience and practical knowledge should be of much assistance to the House. Mr Buick has always taken a sportsman's interest' in the sport of Kings, and has of late been very successful with his horses.

OBITUARY - MR DAVID BUICK, M.P.

Mr. David Buick, M.P. for Palmerston North, died in Wellington at 11 o'clock last night, from influenza. The late Mr. Buick was born at Karori in 1848 and was the son of Mr. William Buick, who arrived in New Zealand on the ship Arab in 1841. He received his education at the Hutt, whither his parents moved in 1852. Until 1885, he worked as a farmer at the Hutt, for his father and on his own account. Then he purchased about 550 acres of first class grazing land at Palmerston North, and carried on business as a breeder of Romney Marsh sheep. He first entered public life as a member of the Hutt Road Board. At Palmerston he was chairman for many years of the Manawatu Road Board and the Drainage Board, and was prominent in all agricultural and pastoral activities. His interest in sport was keen, and he was well known as a breeder and owner of thoroughbred racing stock. In the old days, when the Caledonian Society flourished, he was one of its most active supporters.

His first entry into general politics was in 1896, where he unsuccessfully contested the Palmerston seat. He was elected in 1908, and has represented the constituency since. In Parliament he has been a supporter of the farmers' interests, of which he had a wide and exact knowledge. He was a man of genial disposition, and very popular amongst members. The body will be taken to Palmerston today for private interment. The Hon. D. H. Guthrie will represent the Ministry at the funeral.

The late member took a prominent part in establishing the Longburn Freezing Works. During the war he had been closely associated with patriotic movements in the district.

Mrs. Buick died recently. The late member's family comprises one son and five daughters, one of whom is at present seriously indisposed with influenza.

Buick's wife died on 1 August 1917. Buick had a serious case of influenza in April 1918. He died in Wellington on 18 November 1918 during the height of the influenza epidemic of 1918. A fellow MP, Alfred Hindmarsh, had died of influenza only five days before him. After Buick's death, the Prime Minister, William Massey, adjourned the House of Representatives as 18 other members were also ill. Buick was buried in Palmerston North at the Terrace End Cemetery, survived by his six children. His parents, William Buick (d. 1880) and Agnes Buick (d. 1897), are buried in the same family plot as David.



NZAEL Update

At New Zealand Animal Evaluation Limited (NZAEL) our aim is to support the sector to improve New Zealand's rate of genetic gain in dairy, so we can remain internationally competitive and increase farm profitability and sustainability.

Last November, an Independent Working Group (IWG) was set up with the support of DairyNZ to help the sector achieve world-leading rates of animal genetic gain. Numerous stakeholders, including dairy farmers and Breed Societies, had the opportunity to engage as it considered the sector's work.

Following this process, the IWG made several recommendations, including four workstreams to be developed, which are:

- 1) the process for establishing the NBO,
- 2) improving phenotypic data quality,
- 3) developing a system to achieve one gBW, and
- cooperating on communication, education and extension services for farmers regarding the importance of genetic gain.

One IWG recommendation was that genomic estimated breeding values (EBVs) should be delivered by LIC and CRV, due to their access to the largest genomic reference populations.

The natural flow on from these recommendations is that the development of NZAEL's genomic evaluations (NZAEL 3.5) will be put on hold, while we work with LIC and CRV to investigate an alternative genomic AE solution for the industry. We will also ensure that the learnings from this project are available during the development of the alternative national genomic animal evaluation solution.

Economic value updates:

This December will still see the annual update of Economic Values (EVs) occur. These EVs are adjusted annually to ensure breeding worth (BW) is reflective of the most recent market values and reflect real world costs and revenues farmers are facing.



Herd testing standards:

Outside of the IWG work, there was also a consultation on proposed changes to the New Zealand Herd Test Standards conducted in 2023. These changes were reviewed by a committee of industry and farmer representatives over a two-year period. They aimed to modernise the standards, align them with industry practices, and establish high data quality standards.

These outcomes will primarily affect herd testing service providers but will have some impact on farmers. However, this helps modernise Herd Testing regulation to accommodate a broader range of management practices, differing preferential treatment of animals and variable milking regimes.

High quality data is important for accurate animal evaluation and to help identify elite animals and continue working towards the goal of improving New Zealand's rate of genetic gain in dairy.

TOP REVIEW 2023

A system of classification of registered females based upon type and individuality, TOP Classification recognises that progress towards the improvement of the Milking Shorthorn breed should be obtained through animals superior in conformation as well as production.

Classification is undertaken by Ayrshire New Zealand on our behalf in late spring each year. Animals are scored by trained inspectors on a scale of 1-9 for 11 different conformation traits.

Members are required to submit all two year old cows (both pedigree and grade), along with any older animals they wish to have re-classified. In particular, the two year old data plays a large role in calculating sire proofs and the information is invaluable in that respect.

With the 2024 TOP season fast approaching, it is timely to remind members of the new Milking Shorthorn awards that were adopted from the 2022 season:

- Excellent 90 points plus (9/9, 8/9, 9/8)
- Very Good 85-89 points (7/8, 8/7, 8/8, 7/9, 9/7, 8/9, 9/8)
- Good Plus 80-84 points (5/6, 6/5, 6/7, 7/6, 6/8, 8/6)
- Good- 75-79 points (3/5, 5/3, 4/4, 4/5, 5/4, 4/4, 4,6, 6/4)
- Fair 74 or below (3/4, 4/3 or below)

The scores in brackets above are Udder Overall and Dairy Conformation

Excellent Cow award conditions:

- Cows must have calved three times before receiving an Excellent award i.e the earliest age an Excellent can be awarded is four years old
- To receive subsequent Excellent awards a cow must have calved twice between each award i.e. E2, E3, E3, E5 etc

Ayrshire New Zealand inspectors are all trained in the application of these awards.

Although it is almost 12 months since the last TOP season, we are delighted to bring you the 2023 Milking Shorthorn TOP & Classification statistics.



lan Dibble 14/9/47 - 24/7/24 Kaihere Milking Shorthorns - Waikato

The Kaihere stud was founded in 1920 by lan's father R R Dibble following the First World War, when the opportunity was given to returned servicemen to register cows in the Milking Shorthorn Herd Book. Ian ran the herd from the early '60s with his brother Jim. Both recall showing stock with their father, stock being walked to shows, trucked or sometimes taken by train. Another childhood memory is walking stock the 9 kilometers between the farm on Seifert Rd and the smaller block the family owned at the other end of Tauhei near the junction of Tauhei and Cameron roads. Often it would take a few goes to get the stock started as they just wanted to return home rather than head along the road. The boys would collect bottles to be recycled along the way and were able to keep the money earned.

The early years of running the herd were tough, both lan and Jim had been away for high school so hadn't spent much time on the farm learning and contract milkers had been in place so some record keeping and maintenance had not been kept up. Despite this, their father largely left them to it.



The property at Seifert Rd where lan spent a large part of his farming career was not completely in grass when he and Jim took it over. In those first years, they had 150 milking cows and 100 dry stock predominantly Milking Shorthorn, milked through a walk-through cow shed. About 400 acres was in rushes, which they tried to rotary slash twice a year to get under control. Where there was grass, a lot of it was Yorkshire Fog, not ideal milking cow food, and the back was in tea-tree, 3 to 9 feet high. Being a peat farm, summers were spent fighting peat fires. Over time, the peat was drained and pastures improved, allowing for easier management and greater stock numbers.

Bridges were initially wooden ones with no sides that made plenty of noise when stock and vehicles crossed, sometimes stock would get pushed into the drains. Later the bridges were upgraded with concrete beam bases and wooden side rails. In the early 80s, the walk through was replaced by a rotary cowshed. However Ian and Jim found there to be too much that could go wrong with this style of cowshed and replaced it after about 15 years with a basic 50-aside herringbone that is still in use.

An early setback was losing a number of animals to TB. While government compensation was given, it didn't make up for the loss of genetics. Prior to the advent of artificial breeding, lan and Jim would attend stock sales between milkings to purchase bulls and also cows to add to the genetics of their herd. This was a great way to meet other breeders. In turn they also hosted their own annual sale in conjunction with Dave Clow of the Cloverdale herd in the 80s and 90s, selling in-calf heifers and promising yearling bulls to buyers across the country.

Ian and Jim both attended Young Farmers, which provided an opportunity to gain skills. Ian received his heavy traffic license driving a tractor and laden trailer, which came in handy when taking stock to shows. For some years they did have their own truck but this proved expensive and was sold. For a period, Ian used his father-in-law's Bedford truck to take stock to shows. He would chug up the southern motorway and into Auckland for the Easter show, a highlight as they often had evening entertainment and a wide variety of exhibitions.

Other Young Farmers activities included picking up hay. Ian and Jim would pick their own up during the day and then head out after milking to collect thousands more with the group. You couldn't fault lan's work ethic. He would say "if you can't see the jobs to be done on the farm, you are walking right past them." Ian had never needed a job reference or work outside of the family business, but he was proud to have been offered a job by the neighbour who on occasion stopped to speak to his father. Seeing Ian continue to work, shovelling metal onto a trailer, no digger or fancy front end loader in those days, while the men caught up, he offered him a job should he ever need one.

Early highlights of lan's farming career included being the top herd of the breed one year and topping the Orini herd test group all breeds. Also having Champion cow at Hastings Royal Show, Waikato breeders had taken a lorry load of stock down.

Eventually life on the farm got easier as they gained experience, and lan was able to get off farm to attend Saturday night dances. It was at one of these dances that he met the young lady that would be the love of his life and mother to his children, Robyn. Although she had grown up locally on a dairy farm, lan wasn't looking for a farm worker and so while Robyn did help when required, the farm and cows remained predominantly lan and Jim's domain. Having worked together for such a long time they could often communicate almost telepathically when drafting stock or across a paddock.

lan took his first overseas trip with Young Farmers to Australia, a 21st present from his parents. This sparked a lifetime interest in travel, often tied to farming and dairy stock. Most recently he attended the 2023 International Red Dairy Breeds Federation conference and tour through the Baltic states. Previously, accompanied by his wife Robyn or other family members he had also travelled to Uruguay, United Kingdom, Scandinavia and the United States. Ian enjoyed getting to see more than just

the tourist sites of the country and would highly recommend to other breeders making the most of these opportunities. He and Robyn also hosted international and local visitors on farm, making lifelong friendships, and in return visiting their farms and homes

Through his interest in Milking Shorthorns Ian became a dairy cattle judge and had the opportunity to judge both in Australia and England, in addition to more locally. Taking the family with him to judge at the English Royal show in 1996, he was proud to meet Princess Anne and have his photo taken with her on this occasion. Closer to home he found it entertaining that his cattle judging experience saw him called upon to twice judge dairy goats and on another occasion when judging calf club, a section that included pet rocks.

lan with family and staff support often took a large team to the local Morrinsville A & P show. Often times multiple loads of stock would be taken, and all family members would put in an appearance, particularly since lan had taken on the steward role. Even those family members less inclined to lead stock would be given support jobs. Ian would also be onsite prior to show day helping with setup.



lan had every intention of exiting the cowshed in his 50s, and when daughter Nacre and her husband Anthony came on board to manage the Seifert Rd herd, Ian and Jim purchased dry stock land at Waihou, some 30 minutes from the dairy farm. However this brief attempt at being out of the cowshed only lasted a couple of seasons before Ian, missing his cows, purchased a small dairy farm near the dry stock block to milk his favourite 150 cows. Later daughter Andrea and her son Noah supported his desire to continue milking, spending a number of seasons on farm. Noah inherited his grandfather's passion for cows of all breeds, and now they run their own herd, currently 50:50 sharemilking at Orini.

Son Phillip and his wife also spent time involved in the farm and continue to do so. Ian was definitely the cow person but somehow son Phillip picked up enough engineering and machinery knowledge from Robyn's father and other influences to be an asset on farm, able to weld and drive the digger. Useful knowledge as from the start Ian and Jim have always looked to improve properties they have had, loving a good project whether it be building cowsheds, re-fencing blocks or upgrading water systems and effluent systems.



lan had only rarely sent bobby calves. In most seasons surplus male stock were steered and retained within the business to be finished direct to slaughter. Ian and Jim were fortunate enough to have land in addition to the milking platform available to raise this stock on. Initially this was the less developed part of the Seifert Rd property and in the last 20 years the runoff block on Ngutumanga Rd, Waihou that Jim ran. The Milking Shorthorn stock fattened well, steers and often also a line of fat heifers proving to be a good additional income source.

Ian held the office of Patron of the New Zealand Milking Shorthorn Society at the time of his death. He had been heavily involved previously in both the breed bull scheme and the magazine and held numerous roles at both branch and national level over the years. He was a tireless and committed supporter of the breed. The Kaihere herd has been involved in the breed's sire proving scheme since it started. Five Kaihere bred bulls over the years that Ian rated as outstanding: Kaihere Profit, Kaihere Phil, Kaihere Grenade, Kaihere Maxim and Kaihere Milking Boy. Ian was a strong believer in using home breed bulls, he felt he got good success with the sons of external sires, including international bulls, over his best cows.

Though much has changed across the course of lan's time farming, much has stayed the same. We must continue to breed cows with ever better udders and production traits, lan felt the breed future would then be strong.

Stratford Show 2023

The Milking Shorthorns were judged as a Combined Breeds Class for the first time at Stratford Show in 2023. The reason for the change was more to do with the small numbers of Brown Swiss and Guernsey entries than the lack of Shorthorn entries. A wet and stormy night preceding the show did not bode well, but the day dawned reasonably fine. The judge was Peter Smith with about 40 entries.

The cow classes were well contested. The 2 yr class was won by Oliver Woods E Erica exhibited by Ross and Joanne Soffe with Northbrook Wheats exhibited by the Wood Family in 2nd place. The 3yr old class was won by the Brown Swiss entry with Northbrook Royal Way (Wood Family) second with a Guernsey entry in third place. Intermediate Champion went to the Brown Swiss 3yr old entry with Northbrook Royal Way in reserve.

In the 4 & 5 year class Brecon Taika Poppy exhibited by Brian and Marian McDonald was placed first. The 6yr and over class was won by Oliver Woods P Pett (Soffe Family) with Westell Pingerly Fleur (Ella Pirie) second and Northbrook Open (Wood Family) third. Senior Champion Cow went to Oliver Woods P Pett with Brecon Taika Poppy in Reserve.

Supreme Champion was won by the Brown Swiss 3yr old cow. Champion Milking Shorthorn cow was Oliver Woods P Pett. The senior yearling class was won by the Brown Swiss entry, Oliver Woods AR Lauren was second and the Junior yearling was won by Westell Mont Sandy (Radly Holsteins) with Northbrook Royal Halo (Wood Family) placed third. The Senior Calf was won by Northbrook Sage (Wood Family), Vat Fullers Gus Polly (Noah Dibble) was second and Oliver Woods Norme (Soffe Family) third. Junior Calf was won by Copperhill Jedi Sage (Daniel and Rachael Simons), Laurendale Jazz Fuschia (Ella Pirie) was second and Lakeview Port Royal (Lakeview Partnership) was third. The Junior Champion was the Junior yearling Westell Mont Sandy with the Brown Swiss Senior yearling in reserve and Copperhill Jedi Sage the Honorable Mention.

It was another great Stratford Show with good entries and quality animals and the combined breeds class is a good format. Thanks to all exhibiters and we hope to see you back again in 2024.



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

Milking on a low input dairy farm located in the Manawatu.





Churchroyd - The art of cattle breeding

The Churchroyd prefix has become a household name within Shorthorn breeding circles with successes at major shows, chart-topping proven bulls in Al and record-breaking type classification scores. Indeed, the herd recently featured in Cowsmopolitan (the international multi dairy breed magazine) for the unique achievement of two consecutive generations of 97-point home-bred cows. However, all of this has been achieved from very humble beginnings on an exposed hilly farm in Yorkshire's West Riding.




Richard and Mary Collins were married in 1967 and started milking a commercial herd at Church Farm, Lower Whitley near Dewsbury. After ten years of milking mainly British Friesians and some non-pedigree Shorthorns the couple decided that if they were to continue in milk production they wanted to go pedigree, and as they had both a connection to Shorthorns from childhood, the Dairy Shorthorn would be their chosen breed.

Early mentors to Richard and Mary were George Dent of the Winbrook herd and Billy Goodman, who managed the well-known nearby Kirklees herd. The Collins' also had a very close friendship with John Hayward of the Hooton herd, a friendship that still endures between the two families to this day. The traditional Shorthorn attributes of the robust constitution and excellent feet and legs were well suited to the steep and exposed pastures at Church Farm, but from the outset the couple was determined to improve udder conformation, an area where they felt the breed was at the time lagging behind. Some great cow families have been developed over the years, the Peggys from Strickley, the Gentle family from Orchardholme, the Kirklevingtons from Hauxwell and the Bronte Wildeyes family from the Kirklees herd (the Bronte element of the name was added to differentiate from another Wildeyes line within the herd). The now-famous Heather family was graded up from the original commercial herd.



Along with their three young children Jill, Wendy and lan, Richard and Mary would spend their leisure time showing their beloved cattle, the big family holidays of the year being The Royal Show at Stoneleigh, and of course the Great Yorkshire Show at Harrogate. Ian can well remember as a young lad standing at the bottom of a very large class at the Royal show. Such an experience can be demoralising for a young person but in lan's case it made him all the more determined to succeed, and in 1997 he proudly led Churchroyd Bronte Wildeyes 9th to take the championship rosette at that year's Royal.

Tragedy struck in 2004 with Richard's very untimely death. Richard was at the height of his career and was due to become President of the Shorthorn Cattle Society and his influence is sorely missed, however, he would have been very proud of the way Wendy stepped up to the mark in taking on that role and honouring her father's memory.



At the tender age of 26, Ian had to take on the running of the farm and the breeding policy decisions for the herd. The results speak for themselves; the herd has gone from strength to strength, collecting breed and interbreed championships at major shows, the highlight of which was Churchroyd Peggy 19th winning Supreme Interbreed at the Great Yorkshire show in 2016, and she was also Champion at the National Shorthorn show in the same year.

lan's breeding policy is highly focused and uncompromising; he demands a cow with a natural ability to milk and he identifies cleanness of bone, openness of rib and silky udder texture as essential traits in a dairy cow. Udders must be well attached with correct teat placement, and at the same time, she must possess strength of frame and good locomotion in order to produce and reproduce. In the past, outside bloodlines have been used to improve udders and dairy character; in recent years, however, lan has increasingly used home-bred bulls from their very best family lines with remarkable success. Earlier in the year, Churchroyd Heather 50th emulated the achievement of her dam Churchroyd Heather 29th to become the first consecutive generation of EX97 point cows of any breed in the world! Add to this that Heather 50th is sired by the EX96 point Churchroyd Victor (a son of Churchroyd Lady Barrington 12th EX95) and that her son Churchroyd Pure Class, who is in turn a son of Churchroyd Wild Card EX95, is currently the most popular bull in the Shorthorn Sires stud. Another major achievement this year was that Churchroyd Heather 107th, another daughter of Wild Card, became the second animal in the breed to score VG89 in her heifer lactation. Heather 107th is a stunning example of the art of the master breeder.



Although Ian does not actively select for breeding indexes, two of the highest PLI bulls in the breed are Churchroyd Wild Card and Churchroyd King Willie. The legacy of these two bulls will be felt in the breed for years to come through their daughters, and also their sons such as Pure Class and the popular Churchroyd Pharaoh (King Willie x Peggy 19th). Occasionally Ian will look outside the herd to add a new cow family and this was the case when he purchased Cotley Foggathorpe Lass 138th EX94 from the Tonelea dispersal sale in 2007. He then bred her to Churchroyd Victor to produce the bull Churchroyd Foggathorpe V EX92. After collecting semen from the bull Ian sold him at the society sale for a record price of 3,700gns. Ian is very impressed with the bull's daughters currently milking in the herd.



The Collins' are a very tight-knit family. Ian and Mary are backed by Wendy who relief-milks between other jobs, and Wendy's husband James. Between them, they rear the young stock at Springfield farm near York, while Jill uses her accounting skills to keep the books. Ian's children Harry and Molly are closely involved in helping on the farm and at the shows. Harry has just started a full-time course at Reaseheath College. At last year's Great Yorkshire show Harry earned the coveted Young Handler Championship against stiff competition from all breeds. He then followed this up by becoming Champion Shorthorn Handler at the National Calf Show with Molly being tapped out in Reserve.

Ontario Cow Sets New Lifetime Production Record

The Milking Shorthorn breed in Canada has a new Lifetime Production Champion for Milk and Fat production. Koopycrest Logic Ali Anne VG-87, bred and owned by Shawn Koopmans of Picton, Ontario, recently eclipsed both previous records in her ninth lactation. Anne produced 95,601 kgs of milk, 4235 kgs of fat (at 4.4%) and 3121 kgs of protein (3.3%) over nine lactations, with average BCAs of 345-386-346. This also places her #2 for lifetime protein production, behind only Serol Ace Satin, owned by Ferme M. Dicaire of St-Eugene, Ontario.

Anne has piled up a long list of accolades during her milking career in the Koopycrest herd. She received a Superior Production Award seven times from the Canadian Milking Shorthorn Society and was recognized as a Class Leader for composite BCA on five occasions. Three times she was awarded the Knottview Farm Award for highest 305 day fat production, while she received the Joseph Sullivan Award twice for highest 305 day protein production. In addition, Anne was the Honourable Mention Grand Champion at the 2014 National Milking Shorthorn Show.

Koopycrest Logic Ali Anne was the first homebred Milking Shorthorn bred by Shawn Koopmans, after buying her dam as an embryo from the United States. This cow, Koopycrest Mocha Ali Apple EX-90, was incredibly accomplished in her own right and remains the All Time Champion for 305 day milk and protein production, producing 16,742 kgs of milk, 676 kgs of fat and 488 kgs of protein in 2nd lactation. Apple was the starting point for the Koopycrest Milking Shorthorn herd, with Anne being her most accomplished daughter.

Anne has also been an accomplished brood cow in her own right, as she has produced two Very Good daughters with impressive milk records. She is also the dam of Koopycrest Anecdote-P, a proven sire marketed by Semex Alliance who was used internationally and produced a number of accomplished daughters in multiple countries.

Anne takes the lifetime milk production title from the previous record holder, Oceanbrae Noelle S EX-90, bred and owned by the Barrett family of Oceanbrae Farms, Belmont, PEI. The previous record holder for lifetime fat production is the aforementioned Serol Ace Satin, bred by Ferme Serol of Roxton Falls, QC and owned by Ferme M. Dicaire of St-Eugene, ON.

INTERNATIONAL FEATURE Richford Pingerly Valentine named 2023 Cow of the Year

On July 15th, Richford Pingerly Valentine was unveiled as the 2023 Cow of the Year at the CMSS Field Day and Annual Meeting, hosted by the Richardson family of St. Marys, Ontario.

Valentine, classified Excellent 92-2E, was bred by Don Richardson of Richford Farms. She was subsequently a consignment to the 2016 National Milking Shorthorn Sale, where she was purchased by Oceanbrae Farms of Belmont, Prince Edward Island. According to her breeder Don, "Valentine was the sort of heifer that we thought would excel in any herd, so we were confident consigning her to the National Sale. We were glad to hear that the Oceanbrae herd had purchased her, as they had previously purchased cattle from us."

Fred Barrett of Oceanbrae Farms noted that "Valentine caught our attention, as she traced back to our Oceanbrae Lady cow family. As we had success in the past with cattle from the Richford herd, we felt comfortable purchasing her for our herd."

Richford Pingerly Valentine has produced 54,795 kgs of milk in five completed lactations at 3.7% fat and 3.3% protein. In early 2023, she completed her best lactation to-date, producing 13,118 kgs of milk in 305 days, the third largest All-Time milk record for Canadian Milking Shorthorns in Mature Cow age class. This is despite Valentine having to temporarily relocate to a foster

herd while the Barrett family rebuilt their dairy barn following Hurricane Fiona in September 2022.

Valentine was relocated to Red Oak Farms in Oyster Bed Bridge, PEI, where the Versteeg family cared for her and six of her herdmates until the Barretts resumed milking in March 2023.

Cow of the Year isn't the only recent accolade Valentine has earned. She was also named Grand Champion of the 2022 CMSS Virtual Show in September 2022 after placing first in the Mature Cow Class. Valentine is sired by the Australian sire Treeton Pingerly, the #1 LPI sire marketed by Semex.

Runner-up for 2023 Cow of the Year was Emadale LSC Taco Maid EX-90-2E, bred by Doug Wherry of Oshawa, Ontario and owned by Sheldon Richardson of St. Marys, Ontario.

NZ MILKING SHORTHORN JUDGES

Senior Judging status can be achieved by attending and achieving the Senior Judging standard at any judging days run by Jersey NZ, Ayrshire New Zealand or Holstein Friesian New Zealand, and with the approval of the NZ Milking Shorthorn Assn Board.

- a) All judging assessments must be forwarded to the Secretary of the NZ Milking Shorthorn Assn for referral to the Board for their information and/or approval.
- b) If the Senior Judging standard is not achieved but the member has achieved the Associate Judging standard they may stand as Associate Judge at Shows under the conditions outlined in By-Law 29 f-h.
- c) Young Judges entering and winning a National Youth Judging Competition may, on receipt of the results, be awarded Senior or Associate Judging status at the sole discretion of the NZ Milking Shorthorn Assn Board. An Associate Judge so appointed may stand as Associate Judge at Shows under the conditions outlined in By-Law 29 f-h.
- d) Members who are a Senior Judge of another dairy breed Association who have current Senior Judging status may be approved as a Senior Milking Shorthorn judge on application to the Board.
- e) Senior Judges are to attend judging days and attain a Senior Judging pass every three (3) years.

ASSOCIATE JUDGES

- f) Approval of the elevation to Senior Judge where an Associate Judge has not passed the required Senior Judge standard is solely at the discretion of the NZ Milking Shorthorn Board.
- g) Associate Judges must work under the supervision of a Senior Judge on not less than two occasions before they can be recommended as Senior Judge.

Residing in the Manawatu, Paul's love of the Milking Shorthorn was inspired by his father Mason and his Uncle Hector who had the Willowdale stud. In his early years, Paul was the one who stayed at home milking the cows and undertaking farm duties while his father and uncle attended A & P Shows around the region. The Willowdale stud was known for breeding longevity into their cow families and this continued under Paul's stewardship when he took over the reins.

The first Milking Shorthorn conference Paul attended was in 1952, when he was 19 years old. His father (Mason) couldn't attend, so Frank Bond and Tom Gretton suggested to Mason that they 'let Paul go' and they promised to look after him. Well, luckily Paul was allowed to go, and he had a fantastic time attending the conference and staying at the Zetland hotel. You may think he would recall some insightful learnings at this early stage of his farming career, but his standout memory was his first ever purchase from a 'pie cart'. It must have been a good pie.

Farming has seen a lot of changes over the years as technology has transformed farming. Back in the day, Mason thought Paul had 'gone mad' when he bought teat washers and a washdown hose for the shed. Far too modern for Mason's liking. I don't know if he would have approved of the radio Paul started bringing to the cowshed in his later years either.

Some of Paul's happiest memories are of the various shows that he attended, from local Newbury school calf clubs to the bigger A&P shows. He was always very proud to see his three daughters leading Milking Shorthorn calves in the various classes, and although hectic at the time, they are wonderful family memories.

Paul served for many years on the local A & P Show committee and was often seen rallying the troops as a steward at local Manawatu shows.


Farming life can be lonely, so Paul also made the most of the various Milking Shorthorn events on offer. Over The Fence

We all know that there are some fabulous Milking Shorthorn cows out there but often these cows are never seen by anyone other than their owners. I was lucky enough to judge at the Waikato On Farm competition last December so I got to visit a number of different farms and see some great animals. Hopefully some of these will feature elsewhere in the magazine. But for this article I'd like to show off some of the cows I've seen on various farms I've visited in the South Island.



In October I had to drive to Xcell Breeding Services in Woodend to collect frozen straws of bulls that I had collected. So to kill time I drove a little further north to Waikuku where Tim Delany has a dairy farm bordering the Ashley River. His is a colourful herd of Shorthorns, Ayrshires, Brown Swiss and other minority breeds. There were some great deep bodied cows to see but with the exception of an Encore daughter that I recognised I can't provide any other breeding details.

For the first time in years there was a Milking Shorthorn cow at the Christchurch show in November. Thomas Lilley had purchased the Sunstorm Supreme daughter at Wendy Harker's dispersal sale the previous season and this was her first show outing. She was presented beautifully and was a great representative of the breed. Jody Hardwick also had youngstock at the show that again were presented outstandingly and looked like exciting prospects.



Late in January we called in to see Mark Ring and Sarah Hope in the Rai Valley, Mark had managed our farm for a number of years. They were in their first year 50/50 sharemilking on a 340 cow farm and had put together a multi breed herd including some Shorthorns which they had been breeding for a number of years. A tall strong Kaikoura daughter stood out and the following week a Brecon Eduardo 2 year old placed 5th in a class of 25 at the On Farm judging. There were also some lovely young stock on their support block a short distance away. Neighbouring Mark and Sarah are Mason and Becky Coleman-Cowie who won Intermediate Champion in the On Farm judging. Unfortunately we didn't have time to visit them as we were due at the start a hike of the Nydia track. Next time.



The On Farm judging was held early in February and involved Wendy Harker travelling the whole of the South Island to sort her way through almost 200 entries. I visited Ruurd and Rachel Lieuwes's farm on the banks of the Rakaia River with Wendy where they had drafted about a dozen cows for judging. Two Gorbro Joan's Jazz 3 year olds caught the eye with their distinct colouring along with a daughter of Brecon Pohara. Ruurd and Rachel bred the LIC sire The River Dylan Ablaze.

Last stop on the herd tour was Chris, Margaret and Stuart Baileys at Flaxton. Like the Smiths previously, they had drafted the red content of the herd and they looked fantastic on their own. There were some great cows to be seen here and I thought the young cows especially looked tremendous. It begs the question....when are we going to see an Elmgove bull in the RBG/Semex lineup?



Hopefully this summer I'll get to the West Coast and pay a visit to the smattering of shorthorn enthusiasts up and down the Coast.





Royal Highland Show Edinburgh, and Irish Visit

On June 15th, Jenny and I set off on a 3-week holiday, with our first stop the Royal Highland Show in Edinburgh. For both of us it was the first time in Scotland. The main attraction was the show, but we also managed a few days on a short organised tour through the Highlands where we passed through some beautiful scenery and tasted some fine Speyside whiskies.



The Royal Highland show is a huge show with tremendous livestock classes, especially sheep and beef cattle. But there were also some fabulous dairy cattle on display. It was fascinating to watch the sheep judging with many breeds we don't have in New Zealand and large numbers in all classes. Rob Kite from Cotonhall Dairy Shorthorns, who had visited us at Easter, was the Shorthorn judge. Although the numbers weren't huge there were some great looking animals. Rob chose a young cow, Irthingelt Wildeyes 10 from the Moscrop family as his Supreme Champion, and the Lawson Family's Lisnamulligan Royal Kathleen 2 as his Reserve.

After a few days in Edinburgh, which was a great city to visit, we flew to Dublin to spend 10 days touring Ireland. Our hotel on the first night was in Temple Bar, the absolute nightlife hub of Dublin. Very loud and boisterous but a great night's entertainment. The following day we headed towards Kilkenny to stay with the parents of Liam Quinlan, a former staff member we had employed for three years. A short drive north from there was Ann-Maree Manley who had also spent two years with us. Ann-Maree and her father Michael have the Monasteroris Shorthorn herd in Offaly. It was really nice to finally pay them a visit and see their herd and farm. Theirs is a small herd by NZ standards, but there were some great cows to be seen. They have a young bull, Monasteroris Nearly, who was collected and awaiting his first daughters to calve down. There was a tremendous looking incalf heifer by him that really stood out. His dam M. Grayling 4th is a clean boned, deep bodied cow in her 6th lactation. A really top cow. Another couple of roan cows stood out for their deep bodies and dairyness. Lady Walton 8th was late in her 7th lactation and Iris 4th was in her 4th.



Another former employee, Thomas Reilly and his wife Aiofe lease two farms in Adare milking over 300 cows, so we paid them a quick visit after a night in Kilkenny. Thomas milked mostly Holstein cows with just a couple of Shorthorns that he'd purchased from the Carter family's Ransboro herd. One of these heifer's did 450 kgs M/S in her first lactation to be his top heifer. Thomas farms very much like we do in NZ and has made huge progress in the dairy industry after milking on large scale farms in Saudi Arabia for 5 years. From Adare, we stayed a night in Limerick before heading to Lahinch on the west coast of Ireland and then on up to Galway. We loved the people all along the way and enjoyed the music and banter in every one of the many pubs we visited. And as could be expected, they were very proud of their potatoes, to the point that I had roasted, mashed, chips and potatoes gratin all in one main course dish!!!



After Galway we headed across to Cavan to visit the parents of Barry Flynn who spent two years with us and who now contract milks 650 cows at Mt. Somers with his wife Chelsea and their 2-year-old twins. Barry's father milks 39 cows in what he said was his last season of milking. Theirs was a beautiful farm with a lot of top quality milking pasture available.



Monasteroris Iris 4th - 4th Lactation

Our last farm visit was to the Ballytrain herd of James Lambe in Monaghan. Along the way we stopped at my grandfather's birthplace at Crover, from where he left in the very early 1900s, making his way to NZ. James and his son Thomas greeted us as the first Kiwis to have visited their farm. Monaghan was more rolling country but the landscape was just beautiful and the Ballytrain herd looked fantastic. There were some really good dairy cows including the dam of new AI sire Ballytrain Bullseye. Ballytrain Bloom

30th had won Supreme Interbreed Champion at Balmoral Show in 2018, a feat never before achieved by a Dairy Shorthorn. She was still in the herd but was now an old cow. James had the same issues as we all have, finding high component sires to use. He would dearly love to be able to get NZ bulls to use, but the cost and lack of willingness by AI companies to collect bulls for export is the stumbling block.

Our visit with James and Thomas was brief but thoroughly enjoyable and entertaining. Next time we will allow more time. Shortly after our visit they were hugely successful at the biggest Dairy Shorthorn show in Ireland at Tullamore, taking home Supreme Champion with Ballytrain Marina 11th. She is a Bushmills Jellybean daughter projected to do 7500 litres with 4.1f and 3.35p in her 3rd lactation. Ballytrain Primrose 49th was Reserve.



From Monaghan it was back to Dublin for one more night of Guiness and fantastic musical entertainment and then we were back at the airport and heading off to Toronto to spend a couple of days with our son Jack, and his fiancé Sophie.



As is always the case on our winter holidays, we covered a lot of ground in a short space of time. Next time in Ireland we will allow a little more time to go further south to Cork and over to the Ring of Kerry. But all in all, a fantastic holiday and we saw some really wonderful Shorthorns along the way.

Showing, Reflections on my first Season

My name is Hannah Pow. I was fourteen when I was first handed a lead rope attached to a beautiful but somewhat recalcitrant roan Milking Shorthorn yearling aptly named Diva and was instructed "Whatever you do, don't let go". Now not letting go might come second nature to most farm kids, but the fact that I live in the small town of Balclutha and not on a farm was not lost on me as I focused on the task or more specifically heifer in hand. From humble beginnings, great things are often achieved. In no time at all the heifer was leading, this wasn't her first time on the halter after all, and I was still attached to the other end of it! My passion for handling and exhibiting dairy cattle had been kindled and the journey that was the 2023-24 show season had begun.



My first show was the Balclutha A&P Show. This was a great show to start with because everyone was very supportive and helped me feel comfortable. The girls already had a day out the weekend before at the West Otago A&P show. With the aforementioned Diva or Glenmoor Shine Bright as she is known, gaining Champion Dairy Exhibit of the show. Diva was again on show, with myself on lead in my very first show ring. To say I was apprehensive is an understatement!

I was very grateful to have a wonderful judge who talked me through everything and gave me great feedback. One red ribbon later and the morning was off to a good start. This turned out to be a great day for our show team with all three animals taking out Champion, Reserve and Honourable Mention for the Milking Shorthorn classes. Glenmoor Firebug also placed third in the All Breeds Calf class and Glenmoor Angelina gained Champion All Breeds calf on top of All Breeds Junior Champion. It really did feel like a big time when I got the task of exhibiting

Angelina for Supreme Champion. To top it all off, I got my introduction to the handlers classes where the handler is judged as opposed to the animal, gaining second place in a strong class. Although it was a lot to get used to on the day, I had a lot of fun.

Of course as all exhibitors know, there is much more to show day than leading animals and 'hopefully' winning ribbons. Preparation starts weeks before with halter training of calves and the reintroduction of the halter to yearlings. Feed regimes are introduced and animals are clipped to show them at their best. Animals are brought to the grounds the night before most shows, they are then washed that night and this process is repeated in the morning. There's bedding to put down in the stalls, food and water to put out in front of the animals as well as organisation of covers, halters, lead ropes, and wash gear. The finishing touches include brushing out tails, polishing hooves and cleaning ears. Between the time of washing them and the end of the show you not only have to keep the animals clean, you also need to do the terrible job of catching their excrement and wiping their bum. All this happens before you get to change into your show clothes and enter the

The Balclutha A&P show was just the beginning of a very busy show season for me. Wyndham and Tokomairiro soon followed before the Christmas break with Winton, Taieri, Palmerston, a sodden Waiau, North Otago and Invercargill after.



For me, apart from the time spent with the animals, making new connections with people who also show cattle was the best part. They are all very supportive and help one another out with things like watching the animals, clipping them or even showing each other's animals. Coming in at a close second for my favourite thing about showing definitely would have to be the travelling. Since the shows were all over the bottom of the South Island we were able to have some very fun road trips and of course the obligatory McDonalds or KFC stop-ins on the way home.

My least favourite thing was definitely the days that we had to stay out in the ring on really hot days because it was so hot that animals were getting tired and not performing to the best of their ability. This was very frustrating as a handler as it affected my job in the ring to show them to their highest potential. Another thing that I didn't really enjoy was staying on the grounds the night before shows. I found that I was very tired and struggled to get into the right

He also played a big part in helping wash the animals as well as making an appearance in the ring now and then.



I am very grateful for everyone that I have had the privilege of meeting throughout the last show season. These people are all very wonderful and just great people to be around and learn from. A special mention to the various A&P, young handler committees and RAS. The people involved put in a lot of work to make these shows happen. Without them, it would be very hard to organise such amazing events.

With spring 2024 now upon us, it's back to preparing for next season's shows. Fresh show prospects are appearing and planning is already underway. For anyone thinking of giving it a go, find yourself an animal and enjoy the experience. Just remember "whatever you do, don't let go".

CLOW & MURPHY YOUTH POINTS COMPETITION

INFORMATION:

Entries to the new Clow & Murphy Youth Competition for 2024 have now closed, but our Junior members can look forward to this Competition being a regular item on the NZ Milking Shorthorn calendar, with certificates being presented to the Junior and Senior winners.

The Competition is open to any person in the Junior age bracket (12 years and under), or the Senior age bracket (13-25 years). Calves must be true to colour, registered (or eligible to be registered) at S1S status. Entrants are to use the same animal and be the handler of the calf.

Points are allocated at official A&P Shows, but points are also accepted from Club Shows and On-Farm Competitions, Activity cards are sent to all entrants to collate results throughout the showing season. Once complete, these are sent back to the office to collate the results

Points are allocated as follows:

Breeds section for Calf or Yearling Heifer - eq: Milking Shorthorn/Other breeds Section, depending on show:

1st – 6 points

2nd - 5 points

3rd – 4 points

4th - 3 points

5th - 2 points

If you get placed 6th and below, 1 point for participation is awarded in the breeds section only.

Junior Champion Milking Shorthorn (or other breeds) - 10 points

Reserve Junior Champion Milking Shorthorn (or other breeds) – 8 points

All Breeds calf or Yearling Heifer - Points as above, no extra participation points are awarded in all breeds if placed 6th or below.

We have a great number of entrants for the first year of the Competition, with two Junior and seven Senior entrants. We look forward to seeing what you are all able to achieve over the season and to share these achievements with everyone.

Our thanks to all those who entered, and if you missed out this year, be sure to keep an eye out for when entries open in 2025!


CENTRAL DISTRICTS REPORT





Mike Hoggard's Speech

The following speech was given by Mike Hoggard at the centenary celebrations of the Central Districts Branch

David has asked me to talk about the early days of the town milk industry and my family's involvement.

Because of transport, which in the early days were horse and cart and roading issues in a lot of cases, land alongside urban areas became town milk farms.

My family's involvement started in the early 1930's as my father and grandfather (a Lambton Quay lawyer who did all the legal work for the town milk industry) converted class 3 soil into farmland. Swamps, gullies, iron pans, four rivers, my grandfather had bought it during the depression as an entranceway into the Tararuas for tramping.

After World War 2, my parents established Wairiti Milking Shorthorns that had as its core the Australian Illawara Shorthorns - I guess they came by boat.

Milking Shorthorns in particular looked after themselves. My father's memoirs tell of a deep red cow who could open the gates with her horns (no dehorning in those days), get in the chicken shed and open the chaff feed drum and eat the meal - the giveaway was a red cow with white face. My parents also showed cows and apparently at the Royal Show in 1951, I was two years old riding the Champion Shorthorn - she distinguished herself by trotting off to graze the better grass by the visiting Governor General.

The Milking Shorthorns never went hungry - no matter how good the fencing if there was better grass on the other side - they got to it. Remembering that town milk was for drinking, the milking sheds in those days were basic with no concern for quality control or refrigeration. No effluent disposal - unless over the bank or into the river; no washdown hoses; and dogs standing on their back feet to drink from the bar cooler (we saw this in Australia, on a visit 23 years ago). In the morning the milk

was stirred in the cans to distribute the cream. Town milk farmers were only paid on their quotas, the overflow was virtually given away to export.

Payment was 6 pence a gallon - September to April and 9 pence in the winter months May to August. So in the days pre herringbone and rotary cowsheds you walked the cow into the bale, put the chain on to stop her backing out, then a leg rope on to save yourself a bad injury, stimulate the udder for a minute or - cups on, then onto the next cow. Less cows meant more time for milking. For town milk you didn't have split calvings but year round calving 6-10 cows per month to keep the production regular.

In 1962 a wintering barn was built. Having to meet a quota in winter meant the cows needed cossetting at night. In the morning getting the cows out of the barn was a joy - it was so warm. The frame was only 7 feet high which caused a lot of problems cleaning it out when roll bag & roll bars on tractors came in, it took real practice to pull shavings out.

By the early 70's Wellington Dairy Company had their own factory in Lower Hutt and Wellington City Council bought milk from them to go through their Tory St Factory – yes, Councils had their own factories.

Wellington Dairy Farmers had expanded to take in Otaki and Levin. Surplus milk at giveaway prices went to Manawatu Milk Co. But there Manawatu made a deal with Wellington Council to supply milk - cutting out Wellington Dairy farmers - and so started the demise of Town Supply factories. We saw the writing on the wall and joined the exodus from the Upper Hutt region.





MILKING SHORTHORN REGISTRATIONS EXPLAINED

With the advent of BreedIT, the new purpose built Breed Society software developed to work alongside DIGAD (Dairy Industry Good Animal Database) there have been some changes to the way that we register Milking Shorthorns. Most of the change relates to breed component, and it is important to note that that we no longer change breed component on registering animals sired by approved bulls. All registered animals retain their original breed components based on their ancestry, but are registered into the main or supplementary Milking Shorthorn Herd Book. As an example, a heifer sired by an approved Swedish Red sire from a registered dam may be registered into the main Herd Book and show as PS, but still retain the breed makeup SHM8 SWR8.

Pedigree (no suffix)	S14 & over, by a registered Milking Shorthorn (Ped or S1S) dam and a registered Milking Shorthorn (Ped or S1S) or Board approved sire.	
Supplementary Shorthorn 1 (S1S)	S1-13 by a registered dam and by a registered Milking Shorthorn or Board approved sire. All male and female animals in the preceding generation are also official and are registered / or approved bulls.	
Supplementary Shorthorn 0 (S0S)	NZ Dairy Red, all other animals with a minimum 1 part breed eligibility.	

Breed eligibility (e.g. S1 – S16) is the total 16ths of the agreed red breeds regardless of whether this is from a registered/ approved source or not. The agreed red breeds are Milking Shorthorn, Illawarra, Aussie Red, Swedish Red, Norwegian Red, Danish Red, Angler, Montbeliarde and Fleckvieh.

Pedigree and S1S animals will be eligible for Production Awards. S0S (NZ Dairy Red) animals will have separate Production Awards.

All registered animals born prior to 2015 are eligible for Production Awards until the 2023/24 production season, after which the S1S & over rule will be applied. All animals born 2015 onwards are only eligible for Production Awards from S1S status and over.

- » This is to apply to individual cow awards only, not herd awards.
- » Older animals are still eligible to be upgraded to the new registration system.
- » There will be no change to the production listings in the magazine (all cows eligible for top 20 by fat & protein lists and top 3 by age group).
- » No changes to Merit and Elite awards.

CONDITIONS GOVERNING ENTRY IN THE SUPPLEMENTARY SECTION

- » Registrations will be accepted from financial members only.
- » The Board of NZMSA reserves the right to inspect at any time registered animals.
- » Animals in the Milking Shorthorn section of the Herd Book are eligible to be shown in the Milking Shorthorn classes at A & P Shows. Animals in the Dairy Red (SOS) section are eligible to be shown in the Combined Red Breed classes at A & P Shows where available.
- » All animals must carry two approved forms of identification. Approved ID's are tattoos, brass tags, AHB tags, NAIT tags or EID tags that include the birth identification of the animal.
- » All Supplementary Cattle will carry the suffix showing their position in the Grading-Up scheme after their name.
- » A Three Generation Pedigree is required for any overseas Bull whose progeny are being entered. These pedigrees will be considered by the Board of NZMSA. Where such bulls are accepted as Milking Shorthorn, they will be known as 'approved sires' and individual progeny will be eligible for registration as outlined above.
- » Any pedigree overseas Milking Shorthorn or Illawarra bull who has had progeny registered prior to 31 August 2020 will automatically be considered to be an approved bull. Any other pedigree overseas Milking Shorthorn or Illawarra bull who has not yet had progeny registered will be required to be approved by the Board under condition 6.
- » Any animal registered at the close-off of the 2011 Herd Book Volume 79 that was eligible for showing and production awards at that time shall remain eligible until 1 June 2016.
- » Members may apply to have female animals registered as at 1 January 2014 upgraded under the 2014 by-laws for production awards and showing at a cost of \$5.00 + GST per animal.
- » Members may apply to have male animals registered as at 1 January 2014 upgraded under the 2014 by-laws if born since 1 June 2005 at a cost of \$10.00 + GST per bull. For the upgrading of any progeny of such bulls, refer to condition above.
